FIRST VETERINARY CLINIC IN GVARA, GEORGIA

Within the frames of the "Animal Health Management Phase II in Armenia and Georgia" project, financed by the Austrian Development Agency and implemented in collaboration with CARD, a Veterinary Clinic was established by the Agroservice Center of the Ministry of Agriculture of Ajaria in Gvara, Georgia.









This is the first clinic of its type in the region and it will provide Cattle Artificial Insemination and Veterinary services, consultancy and trainings, promoting the private veterinary business. It will also serve as a store, providing access to veterinary medicine and tools. Within the frames of the project a series of intensive trainings have been organized for the private veterinarians.
